Maldonado and Moreno Join Forces to Reimagine Daley College

The New Year started with a hard hat tour for the renovation and modernization of the Whitney M. Young, Jr. Branch Library in the Chatham neighborhood. The \$12 million investment will incorporate the exterior walls of the existing structure into the envelope of the new building to create a modern, state-of-the-art branch.

Located at 7901 South King Drive, the project responds to the neighborhood's request for a community-oriented library that provides residents with a gathering space geared toward inclusive activities and technology-based learning.

The renovated branch will serve as an essential community anchor, providing critical services and resources to meet a variety of needs. It will feature an Early Learning play space for children, YOUmedia digital lab for teens, state-of-the-art equipment, meeting and study spaces, expanded computer access and ADA accessibility throughout the building.

“The revitalization of critical neighborhood assets like the Whitney Young Library branch is paramount for Chatham residents,” said Alderman Roderick Sawyer, 6th Ward. “This investment in the library’s facilities and infrastructure will provide our patrons with safe learning and gathering spaces for the children and families of this community.”

The project, which will be managed by the Public Building Commission, includes a 2,800 square foot expansion of the branch. The building will be retrofit for energy efficient mechanical systems and improved lighting.

“This is not a complete tear down and rebuild. Due to a high-quality original design and ‘good bones,’ the existing building is an ideal candidate for a gut renovation and expansion,” Carina E. Sanchez, Executive Director, PBC said. “This project will enhance the quality and architectural design of the neighborhood, provide jobs during the construction period and leave the community with enhanced library resources.”

The exterior walls of the existing structure will remain in place, allowing CPL and PBC to do a complete gut rehab and expansion. In addition, the new design creates a welcoming and flexible space

that provides access to library services for residents of all ages while responding to the current and evolving needs of the community.

“It is an honor to be able to design a community-oriented library in the Chatham and Park Manor neighborhood,” Frank Christopher Lee, Principal of Johnson & Lee, said. “This new construction will give the community a 21st century library that provides the very type of unique community perspective of design that can serve as a benchmark for future projects.”

Development of the project will be managed by the PBC with our client, Chicago Public Library, while Johnson & Lee, LTD, a full-service Chicago-based MBE architectural firm, serves as the Architect of Record. The building was designed by bKL Architecture LLC, with South Side native Danielle Tillman serving as lead project architect.

Investing in the Future



Following the approval of the PBC Board of Commissioners, UJAMAA /Power II Joint Venture, a minority-lead joint venture, will complete the design and construction of the new South Side High School located on South Normal Boulevard at 69th Street.

“We are making monumental strides in investing in the education and future of the children of Englewood,” said Mayor Emanuel. “I am thrilled that the UJAMAA /Power II Joint Venture has committed to hiring members of the community to bring Englewood’s children a brand new 21st century high school that will help prepare them for success.”

The new three-story school will broaden the range of educational opportunities for approximately 1,200 high school students by providing diverse learning, music, art, health, dance, multi-purpose and standard classrooms. Site improvements will include fields for baseball, softball, football and track. There will also be tennis and basketball courts located within the sports quad.

The building will also house a self-contained health center designed to support both the students and the community-at-large. The health center will provide access to comprehensive primary care and behavioral health services to residents of Englewood and surrounding neighborhoods.

Development of the project will be managed by the PBC, who after discussing owner-provided project requirements, selected the design-build delivery method in which the PBC requests qualifications from architectural firms and general contractors who work together for the duration of the project.

“The new South Side High School is more than a building, it is an opportunity to celebrate learning and achievement of every student who will pass through its doors,” Carina E. Sanchez, PBC’s Executive Director said. “This is a project that recognizes the interaction between students and the community goes far beyond the walls of a building and we look forward to working with the design-build team to create a unifying campus with recreational, family and after-school activities for the entire Englewood community.”

The joint venture has committed to meeting minority and women business enterprise requirements along with Equal Employment Opportunities for the project.

“We are confident our design will create a positive experience for everyone that enters the school’s campus,” said Jimmy Akintonde, President of UJAMAA Construction.

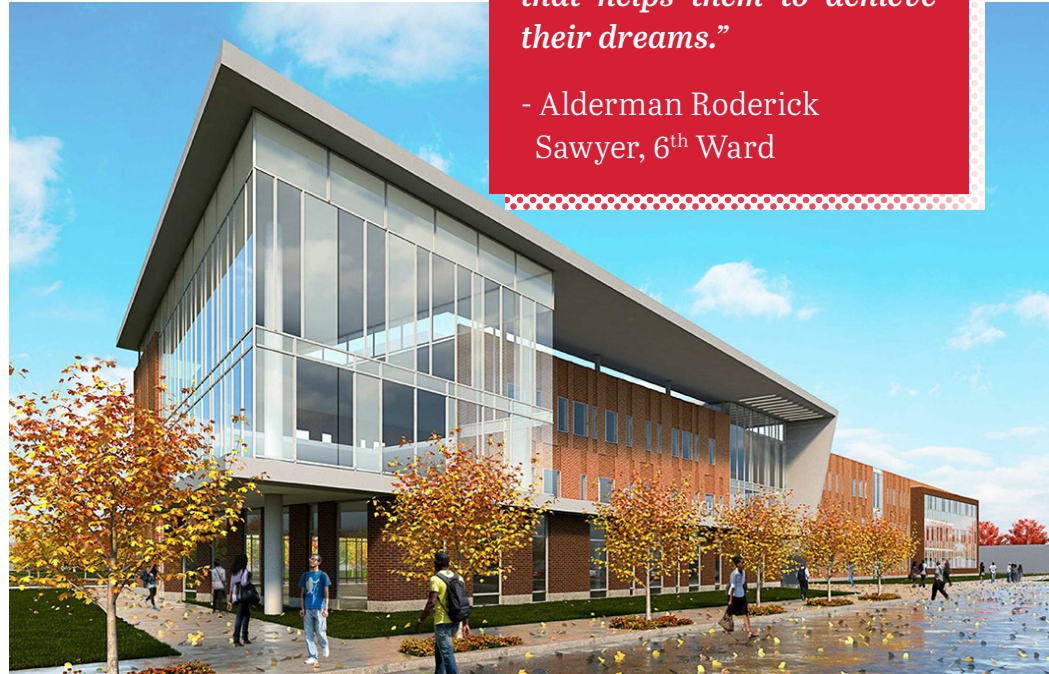

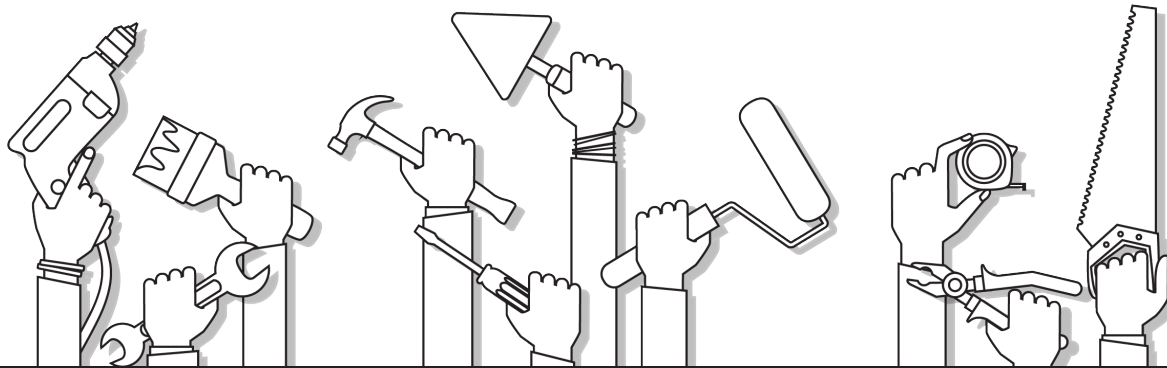

CONTRACTOR SPOTLIGHT:

Latinos in Leadership

Maldonado and Moreno



Typically acting as minority participants on large-scale projects, Jose Maldonado, CEO of Old Veteran Construction and Juan Moreno, architect and owner of the firm JGMA, decided to break away from their typical approach to partner on a large scale endeavor to reimagine a building for Richard J. Daley College in Chicago's West Lawn community.

"The project was highly publicized, competitive and open to all firms, but Jose and I made a very profound business decision in pursuit of this project," Moreno says. "It was a statement that we wanted to make to the community that the days of us just being minority participants have to be re-thought."

Born in Bogota, Columbia, Moreno grew up in Los Angeles, where he

practiced for much of the early part of his career. He came to Chicago in 1999 to work for a company that was later acquired by Los Angeles-based AECOM Technology Corp and worked from 2006 until 2010 at Ghafari Associates LLC. Today, JGMA has 21 employees and Moreno wants to keep pushing the envelope, gaining bigger assignments.

"My work is about uplifting," Moreno says. "So many people are doubted and underestimated, but because of our experiences, identity and talent, Jose and I could not be underestimated for the Daley College project."

Jose Maldonado, grew up in Chicago Housing Authority's Trumbull Park development. At 16 years of age, Maldonado began developing his construction experience as a laborer and carpenter. As his experience grew, so did his aspirations.

In 1986, Maldonado founded Old Veteran tuck-pointing, primarily focusing on masonry restoration and rough carpentry. In 1993, Old Veteran tuck-pointing evolved into Old Veteran Construction, Inc. with Maldonado remaining Principal and sole owner. Now OVC has approximately 145 workers.

"The Daley College project is especially significant for me," Maldonado said. "I've always been a partner

with bigger firms and never had the opportunity – as a Latino – to do a job of this magnitude on our own as a general contractor along with the architect and the design team I want."

The Daley College Project has broken ground and the team is working quickly through the design-build process that has them designing and constructing simultaneously. They are on a tight schedule and need to complete the roughly 57,000 square foot project in the fourth quarter of 2018, allowing students to begin using the space for their education in engineering and advanced manufacturing by January 2019.

"The Engineering and Advanced Manufacturing Center at Richard J. Daley College will prepare our students with the tools and resources necessary to succeed in a 21st century highly-specialized, technology-oriented economy," said Mayor Rahm Emanuel. "We are making unprecedented investments across our City College campuses to support graduates in seizing the thousands of opportunities in engineering and manufacturing."

The new center will incorporate manufacturing high bay space, three classrooms, five engineering/manufacturing labs, two computer labs, and administrative space as well as a pedestrian bridge connecting

the center to the existing college building that includes student collaboration spaces. It will offer 1.5 times the current manufacturing space that currently exists at Daley College, allowing City Colleges to serve 1,000 manufacturing students per year in spring and fall semesters.

Both Maldonado and Moreno see Chicago as land of opportunity with room to grow those opportunities for individual like them.

Additionally, Maldonado share that they have a strategy of working with all-minority teams and partnership for future bids and projects. It's something that both he and Moreno are committed to.

“We don't know if we're going to win, but you know what, the conversation's there. We're taking a leadership role in bringing that conversation to this city, because it is a city of immigrants, and trying to open eyes about the possibilities for everyone,” Moreno says.

Maldonado shares that commitment – “We took what we did at Daley and we said, ‘We're going to do that throughout the City of Chicago, to continue to open doors for minority contractors – Latinos and African Americans – to work together, to be able to show that we can do projects within the City of Chicago.” ★
