In 2019, we will continue our track record of delivering valuable public amenities in a way that illustrates excellent stewardship of the public fund.



The PBC is an independent agency formed in 1956 to oversee the construction and renovation of municipal buildings, facilities, and infrastructure. The PBC can manage every aspect of project development, from land acquisition through planning, design, and construction.

Mayor Rahm Emanuel serves as Chairman of the PBC Board of Commissioners. Of the ten commissioners, one each is appointed by the Chicago Board of Education, the Chicago Park District, the Cook County Board of Commissioners, the Cook County Forest Preserves, and the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago.

Cost Performance and Effectiveness


The PBC's total multi-year program authority for capital construction projects completed and in development since 2011 exceeds \$2.7 billion. These projects have trended under budget by 6%, representing a variance of \$171 million.

The 13 projects completed by the PBC in 2018 represent \$195 million in investments across the city. At year's end, the actual cost for these projects is trending under budget, including a limited number of scope changes and discovered conditions.

Job Creation

The PBC focuses on economic sustainability in project and program development. In 2018, we conducted more than 26 outreach events, working closely with elected officials, stakeholders, and community partners to raise awareness of our community hiring sessions. The PBC also meets on a regular basis with Assist Agencies, our City of Chicago sister agencies, and community groups to explore opportunities for increasing project participation.





Capacity Building

By ensuring that the talent pool for the design and construction of PBC projects reflects the diversity in the contracting and professional service industries, the PBC provides opportunities for small businesses, Minority Business Enterprises and Women Business Enterprises to grow.

Through business outreach events, networking sessions, and City of Chicago Assist Agencies, the PBC offers individuals and companies the opportunity to learn about our submittal process and upcoming projects prior to prequalification and bid events. This effort generates a space for general/prime contractors and subcontractors or joint venture partners to meet and promote business opportunities.

The PBC embraces any opportunity to stretch the boundaries of what it means to be a municipal development agency. To that end, in 2018 we created the following opportunities:

- The PBC conducted an outreach event for architectural and engineering firms to submit qualifications or update their current information in the PBC's Architectural and Engineering Letters of Interest and Qualifications (LIQ) database. This database offers firms the opportunity to introduce their organization and staff, state their interest in providing Architect of Record or Engineer of Record services, and file their portfolio at the PBC. The LIQ database identifies firms best suited to perform on PBC's unique projects, and the PBC encourages partnerships between firms to maximize the participation of smaller MBE and WBE companies. In November, as a result of these efforts, the PBC Board of Commissioners approved 20 MBE/WBE Architectural or Engineering firms to lead 17 CPS capital improvement projects.
- In an effort to affect capacity building, the PBC hosted a Job Order Contracting (JOC) Networking Session and Conference. The purpose of the session was twofold: to provide an overview of the PBC's JOC Program and to create a forum identifying potential subcontracting opportunities. The PBC issued an RFP from firms interested

in providing JOC services. As a result of outreach and public advertisement, the PBC recommended 21 firms be appointed in three tiers: projects less than or equal to \$300K; projects between \$300K and \$1M; and projects greater than \$1M. Now these firms have the opportunity to lead PBC projects.

Minority and Women Business Enterprise Participation


PBC contracts include goals and requirements intended to promote a diverse local workforce and increase business participation on our projects. These provisions encourage competitive business opportunities for Minority Business Enterprises and Women Business Enterprises (MBE/WBEs) in the delivery of construction and professional services and support the use of minority and female journeyworkers, apprentices and laborers.

Projects completed in 2018 total **\$115,743,727** as paid to date. These projects have achieved **33.63% MBE participation** (\$38,927,723) and **11.93% WBE participation** (\$13,810,426).

In addition to project-level professional services, the PBC also tracks compliance on program-wide professional administrative services. These professional services include, but are not limited to: financial services, information technology, insurance broker services, legal services, office management, payroll, and property management. At year's end, of the **over \$12,276,055** paid to date on professional administrative services, a combined total of **45.99% MBE/WBE participation** was achieved. MBE participation was comprised of 36.56% or \$4,487,960 and WBE participation was comprised of 9.43% or \$1,157,713.

Chicago Public Schools

Ten school projects were completed by the PBC in 2018, including the construction of a new elementary school, seven annexes, a high school renovation project and a modular classroom building for Columbia Explorers Academy. These beautiful facilities afford neighborhoods across the city the opportunity for a first-rate educational experience in schools that are respectful of the environment and their community.

The annex and renovations at Sheridan Academy have helped to bring the 1881 building into the 21st century. The 9,000-square-foot annex houses a gymnasium and STEM classroom, while the installation of an elevator, parking lot upgrades, ornamental fencing and a new play area were part of the renovations. The school is designed for community use on evenings and weekends, providing independent access to the gymnasium/multipurpose space.

Like other high-performing neighborhood schools, Byrne Elementary School has recently seen increased enrollment, creating a need for expanded facilities. The school's new two-story annex added much-needed space to the school, housing a new library with floor-to-ceiling windows, 16 classrooms—including a science lab and music room—and a large multipurpose room. Renovations to the legacy building included converting the old lunchroom and library into

classrooms and updating the fire alarm system, while outside, the modular classrooms were removed and replaced with a turf play field.

The two-story, 20,000-square-foot annex at Esmond Elementary School replaced a deteriorating, stand-alone modular building. The annex is home to a computer lab, science lab, art room, library, kitchen and dining area, administrative office, restrooms, building storage, an elevator and building support space. The project also included a renovated parking lot, refuse enclosure, stormwater management infrastructure, a new outdoor playground, community garden, and a turf field. Renovations to the existing building included a new roof and repairs to the exterior envelope.

The PBC also oversaw renovations at Lincoln Park High School. This project, which was done to broaden the range of educational opportunities at the school, included interior and exterior renovations to the existing three-story main building and the two-story separate annex building

The exterior renovations consisted of masonry work, roof and window repairs along with work on the existing drainage system and water infiltration in the main building.

Lincoln Park High School's principal was excited to see the necessary repairs completed, saying, "Infrastructure is not

generally something you get excited about. But when you have an older building it's nice to have all the necessary repairs."

The interior renovations at Lincoln Park High School extended to a new drama lab/makers space and distance learning lab. The music and weight rooms were relocated. In addition, renovation took place in the school's gymnasium, cafeteria, kitchen and common areas.

According to a CPS statement, Dore Elementary was among the most crowded Chicago schools based on its utilization rate. Dore



students now have room to grow at their new elementary school, which is home to 32 standard academic classrooms, six Pre-K/Kindergarten classrooms, and four diverse learner classrooms. Three science labs, three computer classrooms, two art rooms, and a music room with operable partition provide students with the resources for an optimal learning experience. The three-story, 114,000-square-foot facility also houses a library, kitchen and dining facilities, a gymnasium with stage, an administrative center, and a student services suite. Site improvements include a turf play field, parking lot, play lot, landscaping and right-of-way improvements.

All of the facility and site improvements completed by the PBC for Chicago Public Schools in 2018 afford students the necessary resources for an optimal learning experience while fulfilling our client's commitment to physical activity and play, both for students and their surrounding communities.



Chicago Public Library

The new Whitney M. Young, Jr. Branch Library is a quintessential community anchor: a neighborhood gathering space, a classroom, a job training center, a museum, and—with the installation of an Early Learning play space and a YOUmedia digital lab—a creative space for Chicagoans of all ages.

The \$12 million investment into the Chatham community yielded a modern, light-filled building that incorporates the exterior brick wall of the midcentury facility into the glass envelope of the new space. The exterior walls of the existing structure remained in place, allowing CPL and PBC to do a complete gut rehab and expansion, bringing the branch library to just under 14,000 square feet. Inside, a new multipurpose room is an ideal space for community activities, while the rest of the open floorplan provides patrons with both private and shared spaces.

Now, Whitney M. Young, Jr. Branch Library is a place where Chatham residents of all ages can expand their imaginations, broaden their intellectual horizons, and bridge generational and cultural divides in a shared spirit of civic unity. The newly-renovated space will support Chatham residents with the 21st century library services needed to succeed for generations to come.





Chicago Park District


For over 80 years, the Chicago Park District has encouraged physical activity through an open, accessible park system. In 2018, the PBC joined the Park District in their 'Save Chicago's Treasures' initiative, a comprehensive plan to improve 20 aging Park District facilities.

Located in North Lawndale, Douglas Park is an historic regional park that offers park patrons many recreational and cultural opportunities. The historic fieldhouse features two gymnasiums, an auditorium, computer lab, fitness center, kitchen, grand ballroom and meeting rooms.

PBC's work at Douglas Park's fieldhouse included new concrete, brick and masonry restoration, renovations to the roof and gutters, plumbing infrastructure improvements and electrical upgrades.

Chicago Transit Authority

The PBC renewed our relationship with the Chicago Transit Authority with the successful completion of infrastructure improvements at two CTA facilities: the 77th Street Bus Garage and the Kedzie Avenue Bus Garage.

The project featured the replacement of the bus washers and associated infrastructure upgrades along with the installation of new high-speed overhead doors. This modernization work helps to improve the efficiency of the nation's second-largest public transportation system.





Sustainable Development

The PBC integrates sustainability strategies into each project that we develop. These strategies help to reduce the amount of energy used; they conserve our water, they connect users with alternate transportation, they utilize regional and recycled materials, and they provide great public spaces both indoors and out.

Due in large part to the PBC's commitment to green buildings, the City of Chicago is a national leader in LEED-certified municipal buildings with 106 certified facilities, 86 of which were devel-

oped by the PBC. The volume of public buildings certified under LEED standards is a strong indication of the commitment to sustainable design embraced by the City of Chicago.




